





Our Namesake and History

The Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Centre was named after the remarkable local Aboriginal woman, Eleanor Duncan. Eleanor was born in 1937 on the land of the Gomeroi people in Moree. She went to school at the local mission and studied nursing at Newcastle. She went on to become one of the first registered Aboriginal nurses in New South Wales.

Eleanor worked at the Narrabri and Moree District Hospitals, providing specialist health services to the Aboriginal community in a culturally safe manner. After marrying and moving to the Central Coast, Eleanor continued to be actively involved in the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. She was passionate about health care and helping her local community.

Sadly, she died at only 48.

We work tirelessly to continue Eleanor's legacy and are inspired by her to keep striving for improved health outcomes for Aboriginal people.

'Yerin' represents the place where freshwater and saltwater meet, creating brackish water in the mouth of the river. This is a powerful metaphor of two things coming together to create something new. We believe this is a metaphor for the patient and health and wellbeing services we provide, and what the waters create, is a healthier, happier, more balanced person, family and community.

Chairperson Report With Vickie Parry

I would like to acknowledge the Darkinjung people the custodians of the land that we live and work. I would also like to acknowledge the connection and respect that we have for our Elders, past and present and take a moment to honour our leaders who have and continue to fight in so many ways. I acknowledge our youth who are and will be our future.

It is again my honour to be presenting the 2021-22 Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Services Annual Chairpersons Report.

It's been another massive year for our services and our community. In April 2021 we surprised the community and our staff with the purchase of our new premises and by August / September we started the move. As our current leases expired, we slowly moved our services/programs across to 35 McPherson Road. This provided substantial savings which were reinvested back into the organisation and the many programs we provide to community.

Our ultimate goal is to have all our services/programs (except Dental) under the same roof. Unfortunately, due to Central Coast Councils constraints and compliance our Development Application to move the Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Centre has stalled. The next few months will be challenging as we work towards seeking a resolution to our development application.

In May 2021 we introduced a Project Control Group made up of Board Members, the Chief Executive Officer, management and community to help guide the process and have input into the planning and development of the new Centre. Through the Project Control Group, we hope to identify and encourage local Aboriginal Businesses and services to tender for work opportunities. Building on our local Aboriginal economy.

Although we still await the outcome from Council our executive team are busy applying for funding and grants to assist with the renovations, refurbishment and compliance needed.

This is also a time for me to highlight and celebrate some of our achievements!

- Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Together Home Program in collaboration with Home and Place Housing provides wrap around services and housing for 17 Aboriginal People who were experiencing long term homelessness. As a result, our staff and the model of care we have been allocated another 18 new packages.
- Ngaliya Permanency Support and Family Preservation received full accreditation.
- Gulgul Yira Dental is fully accredited until November 2024.
- Official Opening of our Umina Clinic to provide Culturally Safe GP services on the peninsula.

There are so many more achievements that I could mention so I will finish here. But if you're interested in finding out, come join in and be part of this amazing organisation.

I want to thank my fellow board members for their dedication and commitment to Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Services, its programs and services. I would also like to thank the CEO Belinda Field and the management team for tirelessly fighting the systems of government to provide an outstanding service to our community.

This year I want to end with a thank you message from a community member that I received highlighting the great work of Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Services and our staff!

"Hi Vickie, I wanted to thank Yerin Eleanor Duncan so much for helping me out this last week, as you may be aware my husband is in hospital. The hospital wanted to discharge him to an aged care facility, but I wouldn't let them! So, the conditions on him coming home were, he needed a hospital bed and pressure mattress, and a few other things. The ITC program really helped me out! Saving me \$909 and then \$759 per month after that! So, thank you again".

I would like to respectfully acknowledge the Darkinyung people as the traditional custodians of the land in which Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Services operates.

As an Aboriginal Community Controlled Organisation, we continually demonstrate our commitment to Aboriginal culture and self-determination, working with our community, members and stakeholders to achieve better health, social, emotional and wellbeing outcomes for our community.

Throughout 2022, COVID-19 continued to disrupt life for many of us. We have worked hard to support our staff, clients and community through this. Since the pandemic

started, we have supported over 5000 people through vaccinations, living with COVID packs (food, hygiene), counselling, at home activities for our gudjagang's and distributed over 3000 Rapid Antigen Tests to Community and Aboriginal organisations on Darkinyung country.

The care that Yerin Eleanor Duncan provides is exceptional and this is evident through feedback from external experts, awards, reports and our clients and community members. In recognition of our exceptional work in Continuous Quality Improvement, Yerin Eleanor Duncan's General Practitioner, Dr Adam Moody, was nominated and awarded the Aboriginal Health and Medical Research NSW "Digital Innovation Award" – the organisation that best utilises digital/technology solutions to help improve the performance of their Organisations business processes.

We finalised our research projects, particularly, one we worked in collaboration with The University of Newcastle. I am extremely excited about our involvement in this work – Contributing to the Indigenous-led evidence to inform smoking cessation care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women. This research piece has been published in the Medical Journal of Australia!

Throughout this report you will read the significant work of our staff in delivering exemplary health, wellbeing and community services, during the most extraordinary and unprecedented times, corporate services keeping our human resources, technology, and finances operating seamlessly.

As the Chief Executive Officer of Yerin Eleanor Duncan Aboriginal Health Services, I would like to thank the Aboriginal community and families that allow staff to come into their lives, often at an incredibly challenging time, trusting us with their stories and walking with the staff to a brighter, safer, healthier future.

I would like to thank my Executive Leadership team – they work hard every day. To my Board of Directors - I am grateful! You are all top-class people. My Board Chair, Vickie Parry who just keeps giving and giving – you never cease to amaze me. Throughout the past year the Board have offered their independent judgment and expert perspectives that have been a huge benefit to our organisation, clients and community.



Our Financial Performance and Position

Income during the 2021-2022 financial year was \$11.39 million which was mainly derived from grants. DCJ is the largest funding partner, with \$3.85 million during the year.

The positive working relationship and support from all grants is invaluable to Yerin Eleanor Duncan's ongoing operation and future. Total income surpassed \$10 million for the second time in the 2022 Financial Year, highlighting Yerin Eleanor Duncan's continued ability to secure Grant Funding to support the community's needs. Grant income was supplemented by Medicare Income and for the period ended 30 June 2022, Yerin Eleanor Duncan received a total of \$653,461 in the form of Medicare Income.

Another significant milestone achieved during the 2022 Financial Year was the purchase of Yerin Eleanor Duncan's respite house at Woongarrah. The house is valued on the balance sheet at \$855,000 at the end of the financial year.

A significant portion of Yerin Eleanor Duncan's expenditure is related to program and client-specific costs, reiterating Yerin Eleanor Duncan's commitment to providing comprehensive

primary, secondary and Allied Health services to our community on the Central Coast.

Our equity increased by \$515,421 (17.5%) for the period of 2021/2022. The financial statements for the period were audited by Hall Chadwick. Yerin Eleanor Duncan continues to operate with good liquidity and efficiency within its financial capacity. Our full financials are available upon request.

Yerin Eleanor Duncan will maximise funding opportunities to continue to complement current service provision.
